After meeting at the stations, we will depart in government vehicles to visit Purple Martin nest areas, put up gourds for the nesting season, look for banded birds and get an education about the Western Purple Martin recovery project.

There will be very little work involved but participation requires a signature on a group Volunteer Services Agreement for the day and to ride in a government vehicle. Limit of 12 individuals. Highlights of the day will be access to closed areas of the refuge on Bachelor Island and down to the Ridgeport Dairy Unit during a very good period for spring migrants.

It is important that you sign up with an email address or phone number in order to be contacted in case of a late cancelation of the trip. Otherwise you may show up and no one is at the meeting place.

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<u> Wilson Cady's Afield</u>

Feb. 12, The first of the year (FOY) **COMMON YEL-LOWTHROAT** was seen by at Steigerwald Lake by Rick Detroye.

We had a FOY **TOWNSEND'S SOLITAIRE** eating crabapples in our yard in Skamania County.

Feb. 13, A **GLAUCOUS GULL** was found by Randy Hill in the Vancouver Lake lowlands near the recycling center on Old Lower River Road. This large all white gull is from the Arctic and is a rare visitor this far south.

Feb. 14, Randy hill found **BLACK PHOEBE**, Red **FOX SPARROW**, and **HARRIS'S SPARROW** at Vancouver Lake Park.

Feb. 20, Another FOY was a flock of about ten **WESTERN BLUEBIRDS** were found by Steven Clark along the Washougal Dike at Steigerwald Lake.

Feb. 21, Cindy McCormick and Les Carlson had a nice day of birding in the Vancouver Lowlands finding a total of 86 species for the day. They started out in the morning at 21 degrees and with two target birds for Les, a GLAUCOUS GULL and WESTERN SCREECH OWL and they came surprisingly easy. Other nice finds were the continuing SNOWY EGRET, PEREGRINE FALCON and MERLIN along with a flock of 250 CEDAR WAXWINGS and seeing several thousand SNOW GEESE in the air is always a treat.

Feb. 24, Tammy and Eric Bjorkman drove to Grayland in Gray's Harbor County where there was a dead sea lion on the beach with about ten **BALD EAGLES** hanging around and feeding on it. While it was too early for shorebird migration which peaks in April, they did see three **SNOWY PLOVERS**, a state endangered species.

Steven Clark and Sherrie Kearney spotted a **TURKEY VULTURE** from Highway 14 near the 205 Bridge on Saturday. The next morning, they had their first male **RING-NECKED PHEASANT** in their Washougal backyard near Steigerwald Lake, where there has been a small population of these birds since the 1970's.

Feb. 26, A single **BAND-TAILED PIGEON** showed up at our feeders despite our having about a foot of snow on the ground, this is about the average return date for our place.

March 4-5, Randy Hill led a Washington Ornithological Society (WOS) field trip on Friday afternoon and Saturday. Nine birders gathered for the Woodland Bottoms venue, featuring the skilled leadership of Russ Koppendrayer, touring a well-planned route with strategic access points to the Columbia River. Guild Road produced 1,200 SNOW GEESE and the first of four ROUGH-LEGGED HAWKS. In addition to wintering SANDHILL CRANES, a few other highlights included a continuing BLACK PHOEBE at the north Dike Road pump station, and a total of four

RED-BREASTED MERGANSERS in separate locations on the Columbia River. Saturday was even better. Eleven birders enjoyed the co-leadership of the current and immediate-past WOS Presidents, Cindy McCormack and Jim Danzenbaker. With stops at Salmon Creek, Fruit Valley Park, Old Lower River Road, Vancouver Lake, Frenchman's Bar, the end of Lower River Road (including a special access opportunity to Post Office Lake), and a few stops along the Vancouver waterfront ending in Wintler Park, they enjoyed a cumulative 101 species. That would qualify as a new big day record for Clark County for the month of March and would equal the total set last month on February 9. A few highlights include 23 species of waterfowl without a visit Ridgefield NWR, a very active group of songbirds at Fruit Valley Park with TOWNSEND'S WARBLERS foraging on the ground, a continuing WEST-ERN SCREECH OWL, the continuing SNOWY EGRET at the end of Lower River Road, a sub-adult GLAUCOUS GULL with other gulls floating down the Columbia River tending a sea lion "on bait," 320 CEDAR WAXWINGS in two trees over berry bushes, and the usual mundane SNOW GEESE and SANDHILL CRANES. A \$25 individual or \$30 for a family membership to WOS allows you to go one four of these field trips a year that are led by experienced birders and held all over the state. http://wos.org/

March 4, Susan and I drove up and over Dalles Mountain Road looking for wildflowers of which there were very few, but we did find 2 GOLDEN EAGLES, 1 MERLIN and a BLACK-BILLED MAGPIE.

March 5, Near sunset, Barbara Smoody observed a STARLING murmuration near I-5 and I-205 in north Vancouver. Viewing was limited due to fencing after construction of the 139th overpass, but you can get some views from the Park and Ride lot, or at the access to Mountain View Veterinary Clinic on NE 16th Ave. I got a second call about a week later from another person who had spotted the flying swarm of Starlings there.

March 6, The first **RUFOUS HUMMINGBIRD** reported from Clark County was a male Jack Burkman photographed at his feeders in Vancouver. He also noted that the **ANNA'S HUMMINGBIRDS** at his place were gathering nesting materials, it always amazes me how early these little birds start nesting.

March 6, My FOY **TURKEY VULTURE** was flying over Lady Island in Camas.

March 9, I saw 2 **TURKEY VULTURES** at the Fisher Rock Quarry and 1 at 4th Plain and 205.

March 10, Les Carlson and I spent the afternoon trying without luck to find a couple of birds that had been reported from Skamania County. We did see 4 **WESTERN BLUEBIRDS** at Strawberry Island below Bonneville Dam

where we also saw 3 **TURKEY VULTURES**. At Rock Creek pond in Stevenson we encountered a flock of **TREE SWALLOWS**, all three species were the FOY for Skamania County.

March 11, More **WESTERN BLUEBIRDS** flew by Jim Danzenbaker while he was birding on Larch Mountain, there must have been a push of migrants this weekend.

Susan and I went back to Strawberry Island at Bonneville Dam and found Lyn and Gene Topinka looking at the WESTERN BLUEBIRDS, a SAY'S PHOEBE and 5 WESTERN MEADOWLARKS. Lyn and Gene found two more phoebes on the island near the juvenile fish facility by the boat ramp.

At least 2 more **SAY'S PHOEBES** were found at the Steigerwald Lake NWR by Benjamin Byerly, obviously there was a push of these phoebes and bluebirds through the area over the weekend.

March 12, A female MOUNTAIN BLUEBIRD was found by Jared Strawderman near the Steigerwald Lake NWR office field perched on a post near the oak plantings. A much more uncommon visitor in Clark County than Western Bluebirds.

At the Steigerwald Lake NWR, Cindy McCormack saw 3 SAY'S PHOEBES, TREE, VIOLET-GREEN and BARN SWALLOWS, and 2 WESTERN MEADOWLARKS.

Both the **SNOWY EGRET** at the end of Lower River Road and the **SWAMP SPARROW** at the Ridgefield NWR continued to be seen through this reporting period. The migration will really become evident in April with the return of the vireos, warblers, swifts, Purple Martins, swallows and Yellow-headed Blackbirds. By the end of the month Western Tanagers, Black-headed Grosbeak and the flycatchers will be here too.

The 2018 Cumulative County List of birds reported in Clark County as of March 1 was at 146 (158 in 2017) and Skamania County was only up to 84 (88 in 2017).
